
Nunda Historical Society Trip to Buffalo - July 21, 2014

The Society is sponsoring a tour to Buffalo on Monday, July 21. After spending the morning on a Guided History Tour of the Buffalo River aboard the Miss Buffalo II, we will enjoy a Buffet Lunch at the Pearl Street Grill & Brewery, one of Buffalo's most popular restaurants. After lunch we travel to LeRoy for guided tours of the JELL-O Gallery Museum and LeRoy House. Before leaving for Nunda, we will enjoy a bus tour of the LeRoy Barn Quilt Trail.

The Covered Wagon coach will leave Nunda at 8 AM and return by 6 PM with a stop both ways in Leicester to pick up and drop off participants from that area. Hear the story of the Erie Canal, Buffalo's history as the largest grain port in the world and experience the nation's largest collection of standing grain elevators from just a few feet away. Travel along the waterway that made Buffalo

one of the biggest and richest cities in the world while you... gaze up at the magnificent structures that drove its growth. Hear the stories of Buffalo's scoopers - residents and immigrants alike - who worked the docks and mills, feeding the nation and the city's

"Gilded" economy. Join us for one of Buffalo's most unique cultural experiences – it is one that you won't soon forget!



A delicious Buffet Lunch awaits us at the historic **Pearl Street Grill & Brewery, one of Buffalo's most popular restaurants.** The main building was born in Buffalo's Canal District in 1841 and they are proud of their history and the hard-edge character of the building; their restoration features well worn warehouse floors, oak claw foots, booths, and belt and pulley market fan systems to maintain the historic "feeling."





The restaurant resides in an 1870 building that housed a dressmaking business for almost 50 years and then a hardware for the next 60 years. A restaurant was first started along with the hardware in 1927. The Pearl Street Grill & Brewery was established in 1997. We will be eating in the Buffalo Lighthouse Room with a deck overlooking the Canal. Our Buffet Lunch includes: Chicken Cacciatore. Chargrilled Flank Steak with mushrooms & roasted garlic sauce, Six cheese bowtie pasta, fresh vegetable medley with herb butter, creamy mashed red potatoes, tossed garden salad with dressings and condiments, warm garlic bread sticks, warm Apple Crisp (served with creamy vanilla bean ice cream, warm caramel sauce and whipped cream), coffee, iced tea, and hot tea.

From Buffalo we travel to LeRoy to visit **The LeRoy House**, home of the LeRoy Historical Society, **The JELL-O Gallery Museum**, and **Travel the LeRoy Barn Quilt Trail.**



Discover a Century of History as you Tour Three Floors of Period Rooms in this National Register Property. See the impressive punch bowl painted by Nunda's Rose Shave who studied and taught at nearby Ingham University from 1875 to 1892. You will also be able to **Explore 100 Years of Transportation** at the "On the Road" exhibit of vehicles from an ox cart to a 1908 Cadillac.

We will discover the intriguing story of Jell-O, America's Most Famous Dessert, invented in LeRoy in 1897. Learn about Jell-O's unique history and see the new Bill Cosby Exhibit reflecting his influence for over 30 years.

Learn the answers to these and other interesting questions.

- Why did the inventor sell his rights to Jell-O for \$450?
- Who bought the rights to Jell-O and made millions of dollars?
- Who eats the most Jell-O? What's the favorite flavor?
- What happened to the Jell-O factory in LeRoy
- Who tested Jell-O for brain waves and what's more intriguing why?

Before we leave for home, Lynne Belluscio, Director of the LeRoy House and JELL-O Museum, will step-on our bus and be our guide on the LeRoy Barn Quilt Trail.
